Rag and Bone, a family history of what we've thrown away

Rag and Bone A family history of what we've thrown away

"My first two books, *Sea Journal* and *Sea and Shore Cornwall*, were inspired by beachcombing finds that were mainly natural, from sea fans and mermaid's purses to by-the-wind sailors. Increasingly though, I'd found myself picking up more of the man-made flotsam, most of it plastic.

At the time, as well as beachcombing, I was also mudlarking on the Thames on occasional visits to London, where I was born. As the fine Thames mud is such a wonderful preserver, my foreshore finds ranged from medieval jug handles and Georgian buttons to bone combs and the mouths of delicate mouth-blown apothecary vials.

Prompted by my growing collection of discarded shore finds, I kept returning to a branch of my family that included dustmen and scavengers. I knew that over the generations they'd moved downriver from Water Street beside the Thames in central London,

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out to the estuary and eventually the sea. For someone keen to spend as much time as possible searching the shore, this suggested an irresistible route.

I began to sketch out an idea. From the objects I found on a series of shore walks, I would trace a history of consumption through what we've thrown away, intertwined with a history of my own family.

Unsurprisingly, trying to make sense of it all has been quite a journey. The walks took a year and it felt oddly appropriate that by the end of winter, the Thames finds I'd hauled back from



previous centuries were swamped by beach plastic. Time and again, I caught myself thinking how astonished my dustman grandad would be at the contents of our bins today.



Over the coming months, when I would otherwise have been out giving book talks with a peculiar suitcase, I'll use my <u>blog</u> to introduce some of my finds and the stories behind them."

Sandy's glass

Sandy Horton originally trained in textiles followed by courses in architectural stained glass. After completing a post-graduate diploma at Central St Martins, where she won the William De Morgan prize for glass, Sandy developed an interest in fused glass and other glass techniques. Now living and working near Polperro, Sandy produces glass that is inspired by the light and patterns of the Cornish land and seascapes; "Winter Dawn" (right) and "Low Tide" (below) are two among many examples.

An important part of Sandy's work is that it can be appreciated whatever the light levels by using a variety of transparent and opaque glass. Each piece is unique and usually goes through three or four firing processes to create different textures, relief or colour.

After a career as a college lecturer Sandy enjoys teaching and working on community projects: "Some years ago I led





a school project sponsored by The Worshipful Company of Glass Sellers of London to commemorate the Great Fire of London of 1666. I worked with students from the City of London Academy Islington to produce work that illustrated the visual drama of the fire - the burning, the flames, the smoke and the sky. We won first prize!"

Sandy often assists Tracy Watts, another longstanding PAF member, to run workshops in Polperro; and she is a regular judge at the annual Sand Sculpture competition for Plymouth College of Art students.

"My latest body of work draws upon the light, patterns and colours that surround me. I enjoy working directly with glass to capture a response to a time, mood or place. When creating my pieces an important part of the work is not only colour, but also building texture and relief in the kiln together with the layering of different glasses. I take pleasure in the challenges that glass offers, and take full advantage of 'accidents' that occur in or out of the kiln creating unintended, but often exciting effects. I frequently incorporate

agricultural objects or found timber to truly connect my work to Cornwall."

From the history books

One of the most significant pieces in Polperro's art history, and one of the largest at 168x169cm, is "Fish Sale at Polperro" by William Mouat Loudan. It shows some quite striking local characters attending a sale of fish near the Bark House and the Three Pilchards pub adjacent to the inner harbour. As the art historian David Tovey explains on his <u>website</u>, the painting caused a stir in 1888 when it was presented at the Royal Academy's exhibition and an engraving based on the painting was published in the *Illustrated London News*, boosting the popularity of Polperro as an artists' destination. David hopes to feature Loudan's work as part of his exhibition of Polperro's art history in the Falmouth Art Gallery in the Spring of 2021.


In 1919 the artist donated the Fish Sale to the village in the custody of the newly-established Rowett Institute, which remains its registered owner. The painting hung in the Rowett Institute until 1988 when it was transferred to a storage area of the Royal Cornwall Museum in Truro for safe-keeping.

Unfortunately the future of this important work is now in question. The painting is badly in need of extensive restorative work not only because of the inevitable effects of ageing over the last 130 years

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but also because it has been badly damaged, including a large tear which is clearly visible in the RCM's recent photograph (right). And it needs to find a permanent home, ideally where it can be enjoyed regularly and safely by the people of Polperro. These requirements are connected. The availability of any grant funds for the restoration would almost certainly be conditional on a prior agreement to put the painting on public display.

In subsequent issues of our newsletter we will report progress on fund-raising, the restoration and longer term plans for Loudan's Fish Sale at Polperro.



News from the gallery

Although the gulls are missing their chips and ice cream snacks, in many ways life for Polperro's other residents is following its normal peaceful, enviable course. The weather has been consistently wonderful, there is thrift on the cliffs, foxgloves and red campions are in the hedgerows, crimson whistling jacks have popped up in the gardens, fulmars swoop gracefully around Downend Point, a few boats are moving and kayaks and paddle boards have appeared in the harbour.

Beneath the surface things are not so rosy and the lockdown is creating serious challenges for local businesses and organisations, including the PAF. Since 21st March the gallery has been closed as have most other business premises within Polperro, and the village remains largely empty except for socially-distanced queues outside the few essential shops that are open. Government assistance has certainly helped but longer term issues remain to be addressed. Some interesting discussions are under way, watch this space for further developments.
